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## Application Procedure

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### e-Nomination & necessary application documents

The partner university selects students according to performance, commitment and language skills (!) and nominates them for the exchange semester stay via the web-based platform "moveonnet" (= eNomination). After an acknowledgement-email from TUM, the International Office of the home university sends the application documents to TUM. Applications sent directly to the TUM International Office will not be accepted. Nominated Students should submit in the following documents:

- 1) Online application printed and signed by applicant and in addition bearing stamp and signature of the International Office of the home university
- 2) One page letter of Motivation stating the reasons for applying at TUM
- 3) Curriculum Vitae
- 4) Study Program (signed and stamped by the departmental coordinator)
- 5) Transcript of records (all grades you have attained at home university so far, signed and stamped by the university)
- 6) Document including the courses students are attending at the moment in their current semester (and so are still not listened in the transcript).
- 7) Passport Photo (original, no scanned or copied photo)
- 8) language certificate (can be issued by home institution)

<b>Public transportation</b>	Solidarity fee 59€ /per semester (compulsory) & Semester Ticket 141€ / per semester (optional)

<b>Health Insurance</b>	€ 76 - € 78 per month (not for students with an EHIC-card)

## Visa Requirements/Residence Permit Application

<b>Entry Regulations</b>	<p>Applicants from EU/EFTA nations as well as some other nations do not need a visa to study in Germany.</p> <p>All applicants from Non-EU nations need a visa to study in Germany. In order to get a visa, you must apply for one at the embassy or consulate of the Federal Republic of Germany in your home country. You must apply for your visa at least 2 months ahead of time. Please do not travel to Germany on a tourist visa, since it cannot be changed to a student visa. Students that are in Germany on a tourist visa are not entitled to study there. Students from Switzerland who are allowed to enter Germany without a visa have to fill out a residence permit application, which can be obtained at the local Foreigner's Registration Authority.</p>

## Health Insurance

<b>Are students required to purchase health insurance?</b>	<p>Yes, in Germany health insurance is mandatory. One cannot register at TUM without proof of a German national insurance. Students originating from countries in the European Union (EU/EFTA) nations must obtain the International Health Insurance Certification (former E111 or E128) or EHIC-Card from their insurer in their home country and present it to a German national insurer to receive the demanded proof. Students originating from countries outside the EU must also present a certificate entitling them to German health insurance coverage. Students who are not insured in their home countries, obtain German insurance through a German national health insurer of their choice. Full coverage for students is around € 76-78 monthly.</p>

## Banking

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<b>Must I open a bank account while studying in Munich?</b>	It is highly advisable to open a bank account in Germany. German banks offer accounts free of charge for students. Debit cards from German banks are accepted throughout Europe.
<b>What are acceptable credit cards in Munich?</b>	In Munich all major credit cards are accepted. However, not all stores take credit cards; in some shops you are obligated to pay cash. In smaller cities and towns outside of Munich credit cards are not widely accepted.
